Last week a group from Holland went to Ciudad Juarez, Mexico where we saw, firsthand, the current challenges and experience of the people waiting at the border.

We saw a large group of Venezuelans- hundreds of tents along the border and the riverbank.

They can see the border. The wall is there. But it is built in such a way that you can see the other side easily. From the Mexican side, you can see US hotels, schools, cars, semis, and individuals walking on the street. Their destination is in sight, but they are waiting- without shelter, without access to bathrooms, without needed resources. They continue to wait.



## Frontera de Gracia is expanding... a challenge and an opportunity

Frontera de Gracia (FdG) is part of a network of shelters regulated by the local and national government to serve the immigrant community. Over the last four months, four shelters in the city have closed due to a lack of funding and leadership. The leaders of the network, recognizing the integrity and careful management of Frontera de Gracia, approached Pastor Samuel, asking if he and his team would consider managing two of the closed sites so the facilities can be used, specifically, for single mothers and their children.



Within the next couple of weeks, we will know whether or not FdG will have two additional shelters. If this agreement goes through, FdG will move their guests to the new shelters, and will have the opportunity to make much needed renovations to their current facilities. The challenge for FdG will be serving a larger population in two individual sites, continuing to lead in this capacity for the next three to five years, after which they would return to their own facilities.

These shelters belong to congregations that are part of another denomination and it is an opportunity for evangelical churches
