A glimpse at what your support made possible:

2022 was a year of severe drought in our country. It was an extension of COVID-19, which had deteriorated the economy and led to high standards of living. The drought led to the drying of rivers and all the water points in the community for both the people and the animals. The 9 boreholes drilled by the RCA played a great role during this period: they provided water for the community around the schools and also for the animals. Moreover, the relief food provided by the RCA helped to curb the hunger which was experienced due to the drought.



Ngorongoro eviction in Tanzania led to the shooting of three men who were hospitalized in Kenya. They were treated and they recovered well and went back to their families in Tanzania. Thank you to our partners who provided funds to fully clear their hospital bills.

We also held our annual Advent/Christmas Celebrations for four weeks in December, bringing together our churches in the various regions. This is always a wonderful time of fellowship, evangelistic outreach, and witness for Christ.



Although we experienced several challenges and delays, at the end of 2022, by God's grace, we completed the first phase of the clinic building with the help of generous and faithful RCA supporters. The Kenya Department of Rural Health will inspect the clinic building and advise us regarding what is needed for us to open the clinic within the first half of 2023. We look forward to providing vital healthcare services, education, and a new phase of evangelistic outreach and church planting to underserved Maasai in extremely remote areas.

Our challenges of 2022

Climate change was the biggest challenge in the ministry because of pastoralism in search of water and pasture for the animals. Water availability in the boreholes and the relief food helped people to settle. Due to this provision of food and water, the church became a source of hope for the people in the community both spiritually and physically. This led to many people coming to church and getting born again. In 2022, we managed to baptize 2,160 new believers which is the highest number ever recorded in the ministry. There was also an opening of six new church assemblies.

Climate change also led to the encroachment of wild animals into homes in their quest for survival. Elephants destroyed the people's farms and vegetation which brought about animal and human conflict. This led to a destabilized community and many families were forced to stay at home due to safety issues. Women and children were especially unable to leave even to attend church.
