

Celebrating 75 years of RCA mission in Africa!









The RCA has been engaged in mission in Africa for 75 years!

The first missionaries, Wilma Kats and Robert and Morrie Swart, went to Sudan in 1948 in partnership with the American Mission, a joint mission endeavor with the Presbyterian Church. Their goal was to reach Anuak, Nuer, Murle, and other unreached people groups in southern Sudan along the Sobat and Pibor Rivers via healthy holistic mission inputs. To date, these people groups have been reached, and the Presbyterian Church of South Sudan has been firmly planted, with a membership of over 1 million members with 500 congregations and 265 pastors. This is all thanks to the Holy Spirit and the historic mission support of you and your churches.

Currently, your generosity makes it possible for RCA Global Mission's active mission engagement in South Sudan, Ethiopia, Kenya, Malawi, Mozambique, South Africa, Niger, and a new budding partnership in Rwanda. Your support backs the work of 15 mission partners and 30 missionaries through the work of church planting and holistic mission work among unreached and under-reached people groups.

In 1960, there were approximately 30 million Christians in Sub-Saharan Africa; today, there are over 685 million Christians!

We praise God for you, your sustaining generosity, and for the privilege and opportunity to share in Christ's mission and the growth and development of the Church in Africa.

Building a

welcoming presence

Last March, members of Fifth Reformed Church in Grand Rapids, Michigan, gathered after church on Sunday for a series of seminars led by General Synod Council ministry staff, all centered on building a welcoming presence. Topics included welcoming people with disabilities, people of different races and ethnicities, young leaders, and women leaders.

"It was a really great experience," says Sam Eldersveld, student ministries director. "We wanted to bring outside voices in to show us areas of improvement and what the Lord might be calling us to do."

After the pandemic, during intense racial reckoning in the U.S., the church wanted to engage and respond, says Eldersveld.

"Our main focus was racial reconciliation, but it's bigger than

that. We're trying to embody who Jesus is and welcome everyone with open arms," he says. "Our church has taken steps in engaging those who are different from us, especially those who might not be connected to the rest of the church family, trying to notice them and make sure they're comfortable in our church."

In particular, the seminar on welcoming people with disabilities gave Fifth Reformed the opportunity to hear from people in their church with different disabilities, such as Marv, who lives with hearing loss, about ways the church can help her (and others) fully engage in worship. The seminar also prompted the church to have conversations about how the church building could be made more accessible, making sure that evervone can lead worship, speak from the front of the church, and participate in communion.

Thanks to your faithful support, churches are equipped to better welcome people who are often on the margins!

Rebuilding lives in Turkey and Syria

Looking back and

learning together

Several Black pastors from inside and outside the RCA are journeying together through a sankofa experience over the course of a year, looking back at history in order to move forward. The group had their first inperson gathering in May after meeting via Zoom for five months. Topics presented by GSC staff and other RCA leaders included future church innovation and next generation engagement, trauma coaching, personal development and emotional intelligence, global mission, financial stability, and race relations and advocacy.

"We had an opportunity to delve deeply into some leadership topics and be equipped for our own ministry contexts," says Pete Watts, coordinator for the RCA's African American Black Council (AABC). "It was a great time of connection, fellowship, laughter, and tears as we continue to challenge our own perspectives about leadership and ministry models that we have come accustomed to.

"I believe that the AABC is positioned to grow more churches and strengthen existing ones. I believe that the AABC is positioned to equip leaders in the church for more fruitfulness and faithfulness. And I believe we are on track to accomplish the mission with God on our side."

Joining together in

prayer

Every Friday afternoon, general secretary Eddy Alemán hosts a Zoom call for pastors to pray together.

Retired minister Don Poest has been attending since the beginning—and has every intention of continuing, he says.

"It's a standing date on my calendar and very few things bump it off. Why do I value this so highly? I've been the recipient of the prayers of others and I know how much this meant to me. I know that Eddy and his staff value prayer, and I value them. Prayer with others is a tangible way I can support this denomination that I love. And praying with others from around the world (we consistently have a sister from Argentina pray with us) gives me a preview of eternity to come. Praying with others unleashes the power of God, and I'm so glad God invites me to join in!"

Revelation 7:9 reality

With vibrant splashes of color and jubilant celebration, a new church joined the RCA. In a number of ways, the First Reformed Church of New Hampshire is the first of its kind. The church's very name, proudly announced at its classical service, reflects its standing as the first RCA church in the state of New Hampshire. It's notable, too, that this church is a majority Indonesian congregation but very multicultural—and led by a woman, Rev. Jelty Ochoton.

The church has its roots in a Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) congregation established by Indonesian immigrants in 1997. Last winter, Ochoton met with Rev. Fransisca Rumokoy, president of the RCA's Council for Pacific and Asian American Ministries, GSC staff members, and leaders from the Classis of New Brunswick to find a way forward in the RCA. On August 10, the church was officially founded as an RCA church, with Rumokoy's church as the sending church.

"They're so excited and honored to be part of the RCA," says Rev. Liz Testa, director for women's transformation and leadership, who was part of that initial meeting and present at the classical service. "There was a beautiful mix of cultures—so much hope and joy. God is doing a new thing in the RCA."

One of the first things the congregation did was to collect an offering for RCA Global Mission, designated for wildfire relief in Maui. After the service, the congregation and guests celebrated with a bounty of Indonesian food and cake frosted with RCA green and the RCA logo.

Opening of the new King Hamad American Mission Hospital in Bahrain

In 1892, Samuel Zwemer and his co-founders of the Arabian Mission arrived on the rocky shores of Bahrain. The respect Zwemer developed for his Muslim neighbors and the relationships that evolved laid a strong foundation for the relationship between the RCA and Bahrain, now 120 years long and continuing. One of those memorable accomplishments was the establishment of the first hospital in the country—which still stands today as the American Mission Hospital.

Thanks to the generous support of His Majesty the King of Bahrain, the newest and largest state-of-the-art private hospital in Bahrain opened on the 120th anniversary—January 26, 2023—of Zwemer's original hospital. His Majesty the Crown Prince was in attendance, along with general secretary Eddy Alemán and JP Sundararajan, Scott Engelsman, and Derrick Jones from RCA Global Mission.

"The vision of the pioneers from the Reformed Church continues to impact the people of Arabia, with Christian love and the attitude of service," shared Joel Indrupati, the corporate communications director of the American Mission Hospital.

Your support of RCA Global Mission continues the legacy of mission with people in Bahrain. Thank you!



This past spring, over 30 people—mostly young adults—gathered for a church planting summit in Northern Ireland. From there, smaller groups of leaders traveled to different geographical locations with RCA missionaries and partners to witness the incredible movement of God's Spirit across the globe.

The goal of the trip, a collaboration between RCA Global Mission and next generation engagement, was for people to lean deeper into the work of RCA mission partners. But nobody anticipated the quick bond of friendship forged between participants, both young and old. What emerged from this time together was truly a shining beacon of church: the body of Christ-followers, gathering to share in fellowship with one another and communion with God.

Baptizing in the name of the Father, Son, and Holy Spirit

At Fort Moore, Georgia, U.S. Army Chaplain John D. Barry has personally baptized over 50 people in summer 2023. RCA Chaplain Rev. Barry is now serving as a Chaplain at the U.S. Army Infantry School. In his Brigade, over 600 Trainees regularly attend Sunday Protestant services and nearly 200 were baptized in August and September 2023.*

Advocating for people with disabilities

"As a former special education teacher serving preschool through secondary age students, disability advocacy has always been extremely important to me. ... I was asked to serve on an RCA committee created to discuss the value of advocacy in the church. It was in this committee that the idea of having an individual in each church to oversee the needs of individuals and families living with disabilities was born.

"When, upon our retirement and subsequent move to a new RCA church home, I was asked by a pastor how I might become involved in that church, my response was 'to facilitate the needs of individuals and families living with children with disabilities.'

"No single person can be expected to facilitate such a program, and I have been blessed by an active group of church members to aid in the support needed for assistance during child and youth programming. This is also a receiving experience as many children and youth living with disabilities are fully capable of not only having faith, but also expressing their faith both verbally and in service to others."

Journeying with South Sudanese refugees

Thirteen years ago, Joshua Scheid, pastor of Massapequa Reformed Church (New York) and vice president for General Synod 2024, was blessed with an opportunity to serve on a short-term mission project in Juba, the capital city of what became the independent Republic of South Sudan one year later. While there, his group saw and heard how lives and communities continued to be affected by decades of ongoing civil war. Through the years, the people of South Sudan have continued to occupy a special part of Scheid's heart.

When RCA missionary JJ TenClay and her husband, Tim, adapted a Meal for Peace—an intentional gathering to learn more about and be part of peace-building in South Sudan—for the Nassau-Suffolk Classis meeting this past summer, Scheid felt the Holy Spirit nudging him to consider again how he could join God's work of rebuilding and reconciliation that remains for citizens and refugees in South Sudan.

"It was so good not just to be reminded of RCA Global Mission's presence and partnership in South Sudan, but to be inspired to be a part of supporting that work. I can't wait to incorporate the Meal for Peace in my congregation," says Scheid. "I am so grateful for the Meal for Peace toolkit that makes doing so easily accessible. It's a helpful guide filled with simple ideas that can have a significant impact ... that helps bring South Sudan to you. What I love most about this is that our building community locally, by sharing a Sudanese-inspired meal around a table, can help rebuild community globally, in the name and love of Jesus. It doesn't get much better than that!"

Thanks to the generosity of many RCA churches and individuals who have hosted a meal for peace, RCA Global Mission is close to its goal of \$85,000 to provide peace and reconciliation resources to South Sudanese refugee camp residents.
